LEGISLATURE ADVANCES OVER \$1 BILLION FOR CHAMBER PRIORITIES

The Massachusetts House and Senate proposals to spend American Rescue Plan Act (ARPA) and supplemental budget revenues include funding for numerous Chamber priorities, including workforce and skills development programs, hospitality and tourism, and unemployment insurance trust fund relief.

The branches agree on many priorities, such as a \$500 million transfer to the Unemployment Insurance Trust Fund, but there are some differences among the two bills. The Senate proposal emphasizes housing production and mental health services, while the House proposal includes higher funding levels for workforce development and local public health systems.

The Legislature will form a conference committee to resolve the differences between the chambers, with a goal of passing a final spending bill by Wednesday, November 17.
